MORE THAN YOU MIGHT THINK

Schools in Alameda County generate 4% of the waste deposited in landfills annually. That's 48,000 tons of waste a year generated by the more than 350 schools in the County.

If you are ready to reduce the amount of waste your school creates, we are ready to help you.



SERVICES AVAILABLE:

- Green Ribbon Schools Program This
 program rewards schools for implementing
 sustainable waste reduction and recycling programs. Annual awards of up to \$2,675
 per school are available.
- Waste Audits The purpose of waste audits is to identify the amount and type of
 material being thrown away as garbage that could have been recycled or composted.
 Waste audits, with Castro Valley Sanitary District's (CVSan) assistance, are required for
 the Green Ribbon Schools Program.
- **Food Scrap Recycling** Recycling food scraps at school can be challenging, but it is often the single most effective waste reduction action a school can take. Castro Valley schools that compost food scraps divert an average of 75% of their waste away from landfill! Visit http://www.cvsan.org/SchoolFoodScrapRecycling to learn more.
- Free Recycling & Organics Services CVSan offers free recycling and organics collection services to schools through its contract with Waste Management.
- **Technical Assistance** CVSan and Waste Management staff are available to perform a free site assessment at your school. A recycling coordinator will evaluate your school's potential to prevent waste, as well as recycle or compost materials that currently go in the garbage.
- Donation Requests CVSan provides recycling containers, signs, bags, and recycled products to Castro Valley schools. In fact, more than \$5,000 worth of these supplies were donated to schools last school year.
- **4Rs Field Trip** After more than a decade, CVSan proudly continues to offer its 4Rs Field Trip for 3rd graders. Speakers are also available to present to teachers and staff, students in after school programs, and other school groups.
- Earth Day Clean-Up with Free Compost & Mulch Sign up to participate in CVSan's Earth Day event held in April to clean up and beautify your campus. Participating schools are eligible to receive free compost and mulch.

GREEN RIBBON SCHOOLS PROGRAM

Castro Valley Sanitary District (CVSan) has an ambitious plan to reduce the amount of solid waste sent to landfills by 75% and beyond. In 2007, CVSan developed the Green Ribbon Schools program to help schools reduce waste, and to reward them for their efforts. Since then, 15 out of 18 eligible schools have achieved Green Ribbon certification.

With CVSan's Green Ribbon Schools program, schools get the recognition they deserve for achieving a high standard of waste reduction and recycling. Certified Green Ribbon schools are rewarded with:

- A cash award of \$1,600 to \$2,675 for each year certification is achieved. Awards are based on a flat rate plus add-ons for school size and "extra credit" for schools that go above and beyond the minimum requirements.
- A reusable banner with certification year patch for display.
- Recognition at a CVSan Board of Directors meeting.
- Media promotion in CVSan publications and the Castro Valley Forum.

TO BECOME A GREEN RIBBON SCHOOL:

- 1. Obtain a Green Ribbon Schools program application at www.cvsan.org/ Green Ribbon or by calling 510-537-0757.
- 2. Complete all program requirements.
- 3. Complete a pdf application at www.cvsan.org/GreenRibbon and email to contact@cvsan.org or by fax. CVSan must receive your emailed, faxed or mailed completed application by the March deadline.
- Late applications will not be accepted.
- **4.** CVSan will conduct a site visit at your school. After a successful evaluation, your school will become a Certified Green Ribbon school!

RECYCLABLE MATERIALS

(PAPER, CARDBOARD, PLASTIC, METAL & GLASS)



Clean paper & cardboard



All plastics #1-7 (except foam)



Bag-a-bag: Bundled plastic bags/ wrap/plastic film



Metal containers and aluminum foil products



Scrap metal (up to 2 ft. & 40 lbs.)



Glass containers



- Place recyclables listed at right all in one cart/bin.
- Place household batteries in a sealed plastic bag on top of recycling cart. Service available for recycling carts only; do not place bagged batteries on top of bins (dumpsters).
- Place extra flattened cardboard (up to 4' x 4') beside cart. Service available for recycling carts only; not available for schools who only have bin service (dumpsters) for recycling.
- Label all indoor recycling containers. See page 8 for more information.

THESE ITEMS DO NOT BELONG IN THE RECYCLING CART OR BIN:









REMINDERS & TIPS:

- Reduce the amount of solid waste your school sends to landfill by implementing a food scrap recycling program with CVSan's assistance. Visit www. cvsan.org for a complete stepby-step guide.
- Use paper bags to contain food scraps. Clear plastic bags and compostable bags may be used, but must be left untied. They will be removed and discarded before the organic materials are composted.
- Compostable plastic products, or "bioplastics", are not encouraged in Castro Valley's organics collection program. They take too long to biodegrade and must be disposed of in the garbage. Products made from sugar cane, known as "bagasse" products, make great compostable alternatives.
- Label all classroom and lunchtime containers. See page 8 for more information.

Food scraps including fruit, vegetables, meat & bones



Food-soiled paper including pizza boxes, milk cartons, paper towels, napkins, plates & trays



Coffee filters & tea bags



Compostable cleaning wipes & facial tissue



Grass, leaves, flowers, weeds, plant clippings, branches & clean wood



Restroom paper towels



Pencil shavings



Shredded paper in paper bags

REMINDERS & TIPS:

- Think twice before you toss.
 Items placed in the garbage are not sorted. Instead, they travel on a one-way trip to the landfill. A glass bottle takes approximately 1 million years to degrade in a landfill.
- CVSan offers technical and financial assistance to help you reduce the amount of garbage your school sends to landfill. Contact 510-537-0757 or contact@cvsan.org for assistance.
- It's illegal to dispose of universal waste (electronics, batteries, and all mercury-containing devices including fluorescent light bulbs). See right for more information.
- Alameda County law requires that all plant debris including leaves, grass, shrubbery, vines, tree branches, and trimmings (excluding palm trees and cactus) be composted. See page 4 for more information about how to compost in Castro Valley.

HAZARDOUS ITEMS contain harmful components and are not safe to place in a landfill. Words such as danger, warning, caution, poisonous, and flammable on labels can mean a product is toxic. Apply for Alameda County's small quantity generator program (see box below), or contract with a private Hazardous Waste hauler to keep toxics out of your collection carts and bins. This is especially important when cleaning out your school's science lab.



Motor oil & filters



Batteries, fluorescent bulbs, mercury thermometers & thermostats (all mercury containing devices)



Oil-based paints



Cleaners, pesticides, herbicides and other chemicals

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

Many organizations, including Castro Valley Sanitary District and StopWaste.Org, offer free environmental education programs to Castro Valley Schools.

- CVSan's 3rd Grade 4Rs Field Trip. Students arrive at the Castro Valley Sanitary District offices where they learn the 4Rs (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Rot), how to properly sort trash, as well as make their own recycled paper! This fun-filled 2 hour field trip is offered free to Castro Valley schools. Free bus transportation is also provided to CVUSD schools. Visit www.cvsan.org/4RsFieldTrip to register.
- Community Group Outreach. CVSan offers speakers to give presentations to teachers and staff, students in after school programs, and other groups at your school. Topics and activities may be customized to your school's needs and include the 4Rs, a Recycling Relay Race, and/or the Green Ribbon Schools program. Complete the online "Community Group Outreach" request form at www.cvsan.org/cgo to request a speaker.
- **StopWaste.** StopWaste offers several school programs to public schools in Alameda County including the "Doing the 4Rs Workshop" for educators, a 4th Grade field trip to the irecycle@school Education Center at Davis Street Transfer Station, and a 5th Grade Student Action Project. REDUCE: TO CONSUME LESS AND MAKE LESS WASTE

Often small changes can help stop waste before it happens.

- Replace disposable items with reusable alternatives. Invest in durable mugs and glasses for the break room instead of single-use cups. Or take it a notch higher and convert from single-use trays to reusable plastic trays during lunch.
- **Stop junk mail.** It's good to recycle your junk mail. It's even better to stop getting it. For simple instructions to cut back on junk mail, visit www.stopjunkmail.org.
- Purchase environmentally preferable products. Environmentally Preferable Purchasing (EPP) means buying goods that have a reduced impact on human health and the environment compared to other products that serve the same purpose. Select products that are non-toxic, reusable, refillable, and more durable or repairable.
- Purchase items that can be reused, recycled, or composted. Avoid products that are bound to end up in the landfill.

REUSE: GIVE ITEMS A SECOND LIFE

"One person's trash is another person's treasure"— this adage applies to schools too! You'd be surprised how often a school's "discards" are valued by another organization, business, school, or individual. Typical examples include empty containers, unwanted furniture, and surplus office supplies.
